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CITY SELECTS NEW CHIEF INFORMATION OFFICER

As part of the City's commitment to improve technology implementation, Roger Jensen was appointed the City's first-ever Chief Information Officer/IT Director. He now heads Mountain View's new Information Technology Department, which is responsible for planning, maintaining and managing the City's information systems and communication networks.

Jensen is a resident of Mountain View and holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Minnesota and an Executive MBA from Santa Clara University. He has more than 25 years of experience in the technology field and was previously Senior Vice President for Technical Operations of AlphaDetail in San Mateo, where he was responsible for all IT, engineering, quality assurance and technical operations.



"As the home to some of the world's leading technology companies, Mountain View has a very tech-savvy constituency," says City Manager Dan Rich. "I felt it was time to take our City's technology services to the next level with focused, senior leadership of this critical function. Roger Jensen's collaborative style, management skills and understanding of Silicon Valley will allow us to enhance our internal operations and technology services to the public in a cost-effective manner."

PULSE POINT APP LAUNCHED

On Friday, February 14, the Mountain View Fire Department announced the deployment of the life-saving PulsePoint Citizen Responder CPR and Automated External Defibrillator (AED) Mobile App.

Integrated with the City's 9-1-1 system, PulsePoint notifies nearby CPR-trained citizens enrolled in the system to respond to an emergency. The app also directs these citizen rescuers to the exact location of the closest publicly accessible AED. This notification happens simultaneously with the dispatch of emergency crews to improve bystander response while emergency responders are en route to the scene. These citizen notifications are only made if the cardiac arrest victim is in a public place and only to potential rescuers that are in the immediate vicinity of the emergency. Studies have shown that because of the time-critical nature of cardiac arrest, quick intervention from a CPR-trained bystander significantly improves survival rate.

This new tool for the Fire Department was made possible through a partnership with the Santa Clara County Fire Chief's Association and El Camino Hospital.

TEST DRIVE OUR NEW CITY WEBSITE

Starting February 25, the beta test for Mountain View's new City website will be available for public feedback. Users can go to *Beta.MountainView.gov* to preview the new site and complete an online survey about the experience.

Input will be accepted through the month of March.

The beta version of the new City website was developed with public input and an emphasis on user-friendly features. Improvements target frequently used functions such as Contact Us, How Do I and Community Resource Directories, as well as Resident, Business and Visitor content.

NEW EMERGENCY TECHNOLOGY IMPROVES COLLABORATION AND RESPONSE

The Cities of Mountain View, Palo Alto and Los Altos are implementing virtual consolidated emergency dispatch and record keeping systems in their Fire and Police Departments to share the same communications and record software. The new collaborative system increases efficiency and makes regional emergency service response more effective.

This Spring, all three communities are expected to switch to the new Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and Mobile Public Safety software for emergency calls, which standardizes the way calls for service are dispatched from each city. The shared system allows each city to support the others in case of a disaster or a significant event and provide instantaneous information-sharing on critical events to all responders. This collaboration not only reduces response times to emergencies, but also reduces costs.

TAKE THESE SUMMER HEAT PRECAUTIONS

- Drink plenty of fluids and provide water for your pets
- Avoid excessive exposure to the sun and use sunscreen
- Dress in lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing and wear a hat or use an umbrella
- Do not leave children or pets unattended in vehicles
- Limit physical activity during the hottest time of day (usually 11:00 a.m. 2:00 p.m.)
- Call 9-1-1 for emergencies

KNOW WATER, POOL SAFETY

- Teach all children to swim and never let them swim alone
- A self-closing, self-latching fence should surround backyard pools and spas
- Use alarms on windows and doors that open to the pool area
- Mount lifesaving devices by the pool in a visible, accessible location
- Be sure to have a telephone poolside with the emergency number 9-1-1 posted on the phone
- Learn CPR



REMOVE ANTS THE GREEN WAY

As warmer weather approaches, the City encourages residents to remove ant infestations in ways that do not harm the environment. The unnecessary use of pesticides affects children and pets and pollutes local waterways. Fortunately, managing ants without sprays gets better results while protecting the environment.

A new website called *GotAntsGetSerious.org*, developed by public agencies and ant experts, offers effective and greener ways to keep ants out by following these steps:

- S. Spot where ants are coming in
- E. Eliminate crumbs, messes and spills
- R. Rinse with soap and water
- I. Isolate food and water sources
- O. Obstruct entryways and seal cracks
- U. Use baits if ants do not go away
- S. Stick to it to keep ants away

NEW BUILDING PERMIT SERVICES MAKE A BIG IMPACT

For better overall customer service and response time, the Building Division updated its Fast Track permitting system which allows existing commercial and retail improvement projects of less than 30,000 square feet to obtain plan review and permits within five business days. In addition, the Division piloted a One-Stop Permit Program that enables existing commercial office and retail improvement projects of less than 15,000 square feet to obtain permits on the same day as the scheduled plan review. These service changes have expedited more than 300 plan checks during the past year, which helped existing Mountain View businesses make needed improvements.

MONTHLY PLANNING DIVISION UPDATES AVAILABLE

The Planning Division prepares a monthly update of private development projects and long-range planning studies that are underway. The projects are organized by Change Area and Neighborhood Planning Area. Download a PDF version of the report at *MountainView.gov*.



CITY ASKS FOR 10 PERCENT WATER USE REDUCTION

On January 17 Governor Brown declared a Drought State of Emergency, requesting Californians reduce water use. Based on a review of local water supplies, the City's two wholesale suppliers have called for 10 percent water use reductions and will evaluate the need for additional reductions based on Spring 2014 precipitation. In response to these announcements, Mountain View is implementing the first stage of the City Water Shortage Contingency Plan, which is to ask customers to voluntarily reduce water use by at least 10 percent. PAY UTILITY BILL BY PHONE OR ONLINE

As part of a commitment to customer service, the City offers pay-by-phone and online Mountain View Utility (MVU) bill pay services. Both are free to customers and available at any time, accepting electronic checks, Visa, MasterCard and Discover.

Customers can make payments by calling toll-free (855) 288-0315 or online by visiting *MountainView.gov*. Payments online can be made one time, on a recurring basis or a single-payer account may be established to link all utility accounts. Customers can use this service to view payments and payment history, as well as receive paperless statements.

Fireworks can cause serious burns, injuries and death, as well as property damage. Those who use illegal firework may be subject to damage expenses, medical expenses, fire suppression expenses and criminal charges.

The City of Mountain View encourages residents to celebrate the Fourth of July holiday by attending public displays put on by trained professionals. A professional fireworks show occurs at Shoreline at Mountain View on July 4, and is specifically designed for public viewing to safely celebrate Independence Day.

SHORELINE BOULEVARD CORRIDOR STUDY

The City began work to explore transportation alternatives and evaluate effectiveness of transit improvements along Shoreline

Boulevard. The study focuses on three main strategies to address the anticipated impacts of the planned long-term growth in the North Bayshore Area as envisioned in the 2030 General Plan. The strategies include:

- Improving Traffic Flow. Proposals include roadway efficiency improvements along Shoreline Boulevard and nearby streets, strategies for upgrading transit services and facilities over time, a cycle track and other high-quality bicycle facilities to serve an increasing number of bicycle commuters and improvements to pedestrian facilities and crossings.
- Bridge Crossings Over U.S. Highway 101. The City is considering several bridge crossing proposals for U.S. Highway 101 west of Shoreline Boulevard that include bicycle, pedestrian and transit use.
- Downtown Transit Center. The City is examining ways to improve transit and shuttle service access and capacity to the Bayshore area from the Downtown Transit Center. The Public Works Department is working on ways to accommodate anticipated higher peak commute volumes, improve pedestrian and bicycle access from the Transit Center across Central Expressway, and provide new station services.

RENGSTORFF PARK MASTER PLAN UPDATE




The City Council will consider approval of an update to the Rengstorff Park Master Plan this Spring. The Master Plan guides future development within the park and was developed after an evaluation of existing facilities with public input on the future needs of residents. The goal of the Master Plan is to preserve open space while improving recreation buildings and facilities.

The updated Master Plan includes renovations to the existing Community Center and Aquatics Center buildings, and construction of new pools in the Aquatics Center. The plan also includes

other park improvements, such as lighting upgrades, an enhanced park entrance, modified parking, and renovation and rebuilding of restrooms and other existing park buildings.

PLANETARY VENTURES **CHOSEN FOR HANGAR ONE** CONTRACT

On February 10, NASA and the General Services Administration (GSA) announced Planetary Ventures, LLC was selected to restore Hangar One and manage Moffett Federal Airfield. Terms of the agreement are expected to address the rehabilitation and adaptive reuse of Hangar One and the operation, management and maintenance of Moffett Federal Airfield.

"The City has long advocated for the speedy reskinning of historic Hangar One, and we are pleased the selection of a lessee will bring that to fruition," said City Manager Dan Rich in response to the announcement. "While we understand details of the lease have yet to be finalized and will take some time, we look forward to working with NASA, GSA and Planetary Ventures to see Hangar One restored as soon as possible. This announcement is great news for the whole community and ensures airfield operations remain consistent with the current constraints and the community's values."

PRECISE PLAN UPDATES

Precise Plans are a tool for coordinating future public and private improvements on specific properties where special conditions of size, shape, land ownership, or existing or desired development require particular attention. Currently, North Bayshore, El Camino Real and San Antonio are being reviewed and updated with opportunities for public input.

To help the public, Precise Plan websites were created and include the latest information, related comments and a community discussion board.


