RIDE THE FREE COMMUNITY SHUTTLE

Averaging nearly 1,000 riders a week, the blue-banded Mountain View Community Shuttle began operation in January and can be seen around the City. The free community shuttle program has four electric shuttles. Each shuttle has seating for 16 passengers, a wheelchair lift, space for two wheelchairs, WiFi connectivity and bicycle racks on the

outside of the vehicle. Funded by Google, the shuttle pilot program is intended to offer residents and visitors a transportation alternative to move between neighborhoods, shopping centers, medical complexes, City facilities and recreation areas.

On weekdays, the shuttles operate from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. On weekends and holidays, shuttles operate from noon until 8:00 p.m. For more information on shuttle routes and schedules, visit *MVCommunityShuttle.com* or call the hotline at (855) 730-RIDE (7433).



AFFORDABLE HOUSING GETS A LITTLE HELP

The City Council has voted to increase the fees paid by developers on office, high technology and industrial developments within the city, as well as fees paid by those who offer rental housing. The new development fees became effective in February and are used to help address the impact of new development on the need for more affordable housing within the city through the construction of rental housing projects for lower income households. Three new affordable developments have applied for this funding: a 116-unit workforce housing project on Evelyn Avenue, a 51-unit family project on Shoreline Boulevard, and a 49-unit senior project on West El Camino Real.


Mountain View first implemented housing fees more than ten years ago through the Below Market Rate (BMR) Housing Program and Housing Impact Fee and recently added a housing fee on new apartment development. The Council held a public hearing and received input through two stakeholder meetings and an Open City Hall Forum before making its decision. NEW TEEN CENTER IS OPEN

While the new View Teen Center was opened last Fall with a big dedication celebration, the new center is already providing outstanding programs for Mountain View students in grades 6 –12. The facility offers a commercial pool table, foosball table, ping pong table, air hockey table, video games, movies, a large kitchen, a computer room, an outdoor patio and a large outdoor grass area for play and sports. Programming in the facil-



and sports. Programming in the facility includes art, music, dance, health, fitness, sports, culinary arts and life skills. These programs are offered on a drop-in basis, through classes and through special events.

NEW CITY MINIMUM WAGE STARTS JULY 1

Starting July 1, the minimum wage in Mountain View will be \$10.30 per hour with annual adjustments for inflation on January 1 of each following year. The new wage rate was established by City Council in October 2014 and matches the wage in San Jose. City staff is working with local businesses to ensure our community is prepared for the change.

In addition to the new minimum wage rate, City Council also set a goal to reach a minimum wage of \$15.00 per hour by 2018. To achieve this goal, City staff is working in cooperation with neighboring cities, regional organizations, and continues to monitor input from the Mountain View community. On March 31, City staff will provide an update to Council on regional minimum wage developments and seek direction on a work plan for moving forward.

CITY EXPANDS VETERANS MEMORIAL IN EAGLE PARK

The City is in the process of relocating two memorial plaques honoring veterans to a renovated Veterans Memorial in Eagle Park at 650 Franklin St. A third plaque, honoring students from the former Mountain View Union High School killed in World War II, is currently located in the park. A new, fourth plaque is planned. In addition, military service emblems and granite panels with the names of Mountain View veterans will be added.

The City is scheduled to dedicate the updated memorial on November 11 for Veterans Day. Anyone may purchase an engraving to honor a U. S. veteran who served honorably. Veterans are those who are still serving or have served, whether living or deceased,



TIPS FOR BEATING SUMMER HEAT

As warm weather approaches, follow this easy tips to stay cool and safe.

- Drink plenty of liquids, including water and sports drinks, even if you do not feel thirsty.
- Avoid alcohol, caffeine and sugar because they make you lose fluids.
- Avoid physical activity during the hottest time of the day: 10:00 a.m. 3:00 p.m.
- NEVER leave people or pets in a closed, parked car.
- Stay in air-conditioned areas, such as malls, libraries, movie theatres and community centers.
- Cool off by taking a bath or shower.
- Do not cool children in alcohol baths.
- Wear lightweight, light-colored and loose-fitting clothing—preferably cotton.
- Do not bundle babies in blankets or heavy clothing.
- Wear a wide-brimmed, vented hat or use an umbrella when outdoors.
- Wear sunglasses and sunscreen with SPF 15 or higher when outdoors.
- Rest often in shady areas.



REGISTER FOR SWIM LESSONS IN MARCH

Registration for City Spring and Summer swim lessons begins March 9 for Mountain View residents. Classes for toddlers, preschoolers and swimmers in levels 1-6 will be available through the Recreation Division.

SUMMER CERT TRAINING

The next Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training program begins on May 27. Free to residents of Mountain View and employees of Mountain View businesses. The program begins May 27 and runs June 3, 10, 17, and 24 from 6:30 – 9:30 p.m. The final class on Saturday, June 27 will be from 1:00 – 5:00 p.m.

CERT team training prepares local residents to help themselves, their families and neighbors in the event of a disaster. CERT members receive training in earth-quake awareness, disaster fire suppression techniques, disaster medical operations, light search and rescue, team organization and team management. The training covers basic skills that are important to know in a disaster when emergency services may not be readily available.

MVPD EXPANDS OFFICER WORN CAMERA PROGRAM

In January 2012, MVPD issued ten officer-worn cameras to a voluntary group of patrol officers who tested the system and provided essential feedback. As a result, an additional 66 camera systems were requested for all uniformed patrol officers.

In the Spring of 2014, the last round of officer-worn cameras arrived. Since then, MVPD has been working with the Mountain View Police Officers' Association



to create a policy for the deployment of these cameras. Of utmost concern with recorded footage is the preservation of privacy for members of the Mountain View community and victims of crime.

"We are fortunate to enjoy a great relationship with the community we serve and protect," says Chief Max Bosel. "This relationship is built on a foundation of trust and respect. We believe that officer-worn cameras will only improve levels of service that is expected of us and continue to demonstrate transparency and openness in our interactions with those we serve."

NEW CRIME SOFTWARE HELPS POLICE

The Mountain View Police Department has initiated the use of PredPol, a new type of predictive analytics software that helps the Department predict likely areas in which crime may occur.

Based on crime report data, the program produces a crime area map. Officers can focus patrols in those areas, while also maintaining a presence and responding to calls in other areas. Use of the software has been credited with reducing crime in Los Angeles, Modesto, Alhambra and other U.S. cities.

The Mountain View Child Care Center, located at 260 Escuela Ave., provides preschool for children six

The Learning Links Preschool program serves approximately 90 children, offers rolling enrollment and has a curriculum of learning experiences suitable for children regardless of ability, temperament,



culture or socioeconomic background.








MAJOR PROJECTS AND PLANS

SHORELINE BOULEVARD CORRIDOR IMPROVEMENTS



The City Council has approved a conceptual plan for transit, bicycle and pedestrian facility improvements along the Shoreline Boulevard Corridor—the area between the Downtown Transit Center and the area north of the Bayshore Freeway-where many Mountain View companies are located. The improvements are necessary to support anticipated increases in employment and development in the North Bayshore Area. City staff will implement the planned improvements in phases. PARKS AND OPEN SPACE PLAN COMPLETE

Mountain View has completed an update to the Parks and Open Space Plan, which guides the development of new parks and open space within the City, as well as improvements to existing parks and open space. The City Council approved the update in October.



The 2014 Parks and Open Space Plan includes a review of current and future open space needs within the community and within each neighborhood, along with a list of priorities for projects designed to serve neighborhoods that are most in need of additional open

BICYCLE TRANSPORTATION PLAN UPDATE

The City has held two community workshops and is scheduled to release a draft Bicycle Transportation Plan this Summer, followed by completion of the related environmental review process in the Fall. Adoption of the final plan is expected by early 2016.

The Bicycle Transportation Plan update builds on the City's previous 2008 Bike Plan and the 2030 General Plan's mobility goals which were created to encourage bicycling and guide the City's future bicycle-related improvements, programs and policies. In addition, the Plan update has been shaped by public input from community workshops, City advisory committees and stakeholders.

TREE MASTER PLAN

In order to better preserve and maintain Mountain View's trees, the City is in the process of creating a Community Tree Master Plan. The Parks and Recreation Commission and the Environmental Planning Commission reviewed the draft in 2014. The City Council is expected to consider the draft at a study session this Spring. PRECISE PLAN UPDATES

The City has created Precise Plans to establish zoning regulations and requirements for Mountain View's various neighborhoods. Several of these plans have been updated to reflect the planning guidelines set down in the City's 2030 General Plan. Here is a summary of recent decisions in the update process.

El Camino Real Precise Plan

In November, the City Council approved the El Camino Real Precise Plan, which promotes the revitalization of the area with a vibrant mix of land uses and pedes-

improvetrian ments. City staff several key provi-



sions of the Plan, including the monitoring of key development data, integrating the Plan with the City's Bicycle Transportation Plan and developing a design palette for public improvements. San Antonio Precise Plan

In December, the City Council approved the San Antonio Precise Plan, which envisions the area as a diverse regional and community destination with a wide variety

of land uses and enhanced bicycle and City features.

pedestrian PRECISE

staff will implement several key provisions of the Plan, including integration with the Bicycle Transportation Plan and other mobility studies, monitoring key development data and prioritizing public benefit provisions and improvements. North Bayshore Precise Plan

In November, the City Council approved the North Bayshore Precise Plan, which calls for greater development intensity, more diverse land uses, transportation improvements and sustainable development. City staff

will implement several key Plan provisions, including updating the number of acceptable vehicle trips in and out of the North Bayshore area each day and evaluating development



requests for higher density development. In February, Council provided direction to staff to return with a work plan for studying how new residential uses may be incorporated with the North Bayshore Precise Plan. THINGS YOU CAN DO FOR EARTH DAY APRIL 22

Here are things you can do to help celebrate Earth

- Flying: Take the train or bus rather than flying
- Driving: Carpool or telecommute one day a week
- Vehicle Maintenance: Remove excess items from your vehicle and keep your engine tuned and tires inflated
- Vehicle Idling: Turn off your engine if stopped longer than 30 seconds
- House Leaks: Use caulk or weather-stripping and install insulation
- Home Heating and Cooling: Install a programmable thermostat
- Home Hot Water: Wash clothes in cold water, use powder detergent, lower temperature settings of your heater, wrap heater with insulation and install efficient faucets and showerheads
- Electricity Waste: Turn off and unplug unused electronics, set computers to hibernate, turn off unneeded lights and consolidate to only one refrigerator
- Appliances: Buy efficient Energy Star appliances
- Lighting: Replace incandescent bulbs with CFLs or
- Food Choice: Eat poultry or fish in place of red meat, consume plant-based foods rather than dairy, and try not eating any meat one day a week
- Food Waste: Avoid purchasing more food than you can eat and refrigerate food promptly
- Product Usage: Print double-sided, buy recycled products, stop unwanted catalog subscriptions and avoid bottled water and products with excessive packaging
- Recycling: Give new life to all your paper, plastics and metals, and try composting



REBATES FOR MULTI-FAMILY ENERGY UPGRADES

The Bay Area Multi-Family Building Program offers cash rebates and up to \$5,000 of free consulting for multi-family property owners who undertake energy upgrades. The program assists in planning energy saving improvements and provides \$750 per unit in rebates to help pay for the upgrades. The program is open to multi-family buildings with five or more attached units in the nine-county Bay Area.

The program connects homeowners with participating contractors who can plan and complete the upgrade project, and offers rebates and incentives up to \$4,500. CaliforniaFIRST offers low-cost, long-term, 100% upfront financing for residential and commercial energy efficiency, renewable energy and water conservation upgrades. Eligible buildings include single-family homes, multi-family buildings and commercial/industrial properties. Financing can be for up to 20 years with affordable fixed rates. No credit check is required and repayments are conveniently made through the property tax bill.
