

BICYCLE TRANSPORTATION PLAN



The City is updating the Mountain View Bicycle Transportation Plan to encourage bicycling and to help guide policies and programs that relate to biking. The Bike Plan Update will build on the 2008 Bike Plan, and incorporate the 2030 General Plan mobility goals.

During the last several months, City staff held five meetings with members of the public to gather input regarding bicycle-related needs, concerns and opportunities for future improvements. The results of these discussions will BIKE MOUNTAIN VIEW help shape the preliminary goals for the Bike Plan Update



currently underway. Another community workshop will be held in early 2015 to present the Bike Plan's findings and allow the public to give more feedback. Completion of the Draft Bike Plan Update is expected in May 2015 followed by the

completion of the environmental review process in Fall 2015. Adoption of the final Bike Plan Update is expected in early 2016. To learn more about the Bike Plan Update,

FREE SHUTTLE SERVICE BEGINS IN JANUARY

In January, the City will begin a new free shuttle service in partnership with Google. The service will be part of a two-year pilot project and will include four electric vehicles fitted with bike racks. It will run daily and stops will connect residential areas to shopping destinations, downtown Mountain View, entertainment attractions, community facilities and other transportation systems.

The City and Google have been examining proposals to reduce the number of vehicles on the road and promote alternative transit options, and this shuttle service was selected as a first step. The shuttle service is expected to run up to four, 16-seat, ADA compliant electric shuttles from 10:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. On weekends and holidays, the shuttle will run between noon and 8:00 p.m.

The initial shuttle route was designed with input from the community. Adjustments to the route and service will be considered after the shuttle has been in operation for several months, when riders and community members will have an opportunity for additional input regarding their needs and ideas for improvements.

NEWS FOR YOU

PROTECT YOUR HOLIDAY PACKAGES

Here are some helpful suggestions from the Police Department to keep your holiday deliveries from being stolen this season.

Require a signature for packages you are having

delivered. If you do not expect to be at home, you should have the packages delivered to a trusted neighbor, friend or to your workplace.



If your packages are stolen, report the theft to the delivery company and online to the Mountain View Police Department by visiting www.mvpd.gov.

Help keep your neighborhood safe by reporting any suspicious activity to the Police Department's non-emergency number at (650) 903-6395. You may also text an anonymous tip to 274637 and include the words 'MV TIPS' in the body of your message.

For Police or Fire emergencies, always call 9-1-1. For other information call (650) 903-6395.

IRS SCAM WARNING

The Police Department warns residents that if they receive mail or phone calls saying they owe money to the Internal Revenue Service and payments must be made by pre-paid debit card or wire transfer, it is a scam.



If this happens to you, call the IRS at (800) 829-1040 and determine whether you owe money. If you do, ask how to proceed properly with payment. If you are certain you owe no money, report the incident by calling (800) 366-4484. You may also visit www.FTC.gov and use the Complaint Assistant to report the scam.

In addition, call the Mountain View Police Department to file a report at (650) 903-6344 or call the emergency number 9-1-1.



FIRE SAFETY REMINDERS

One of the leading causes of home fire deaths is the careless use of heating equipment. The Mountain View Fire Department offers these simple tips for preventing burns and fires:

- Keep flammable materials at least three feet away from heating equipment, such as furnaces, fireplaces, wood stoves and space heaters.
- Maintain a three foot kid-free zone around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a professional.
- Remember to turn off portable heaters when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Test smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms

HOME HEATING AND ENERGY SAVING TIPS

You can stay safe and save money with the following tips for heating your home.

- Have your heating equipment inspected and cleaned every fall before the heating season, including checking and sealing your ducts.
- Keep your heating equipment at least three feet apart from any combustible materials.
- Never use or store flammable or combustible liquids near or in rooms with heaters.
- Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home, particularly bedrooms.
- Install a programmable thermostat to avoid heating your home when you are not there.
- Avoid using electric space heaters since they are typically very inefficient.
- On sunny days, open window blinds to allow heat to enter, and close the blinds after sunset to preserve the heat.
- Replace old blinds with honey-comb or other insulated blinds.
- Replace single-pane windows with dual-pane versions and replace old caulk to help seal windows.
- When you replace your furnace, buy the highest efficiency model you can afford.

REBATES FOR HOME ENERGY AND WATER UPGRADES

Energy Upgrade California (EUC) is a State program that helps residents make energy saving home improvements and offers rebates and incentives of up to \$4,500 to participants. Improvements may include installing insulation, new windows or solar PV, or replacing furnace or air conditioning systems. The program connects homeowners with participating contractors who can plan and complete the upgrade project. A rigorous quality assurance system ensures that EUC projects meet program standards. FINANCING FOR RESIDENTIAL AND **COMMERCIAL GREEN UPGRADES**

Through the City's participation in CaliforniaFIRST, Mountain View residents and businesses may be eligible to take advantage of low-cost financing to make green improvements to their properties. CaliforniaFIRST offers low-cost, long-term, 100% up-front financing for residential and commercial energy efficiency, renewable energy and water conservation upgrades.

Eligible buildings include single-family homes, multifamily buildings, and commercial and industrial properties. Financing can be for up to 20 years, and affordable fixed rates allow property owners to match repayments with dollar savings. No credit check is required, and repayments are conveniently made through the property


REBATES FOR MULTI-FAMILY ENERGY UPGRADES

Energy Upgrade California's Bay Area Multi-Family Building Program offers cash rebates and up to \$5,000 of free consulting for multi-family property owners who undertake energy upgrades. The program assists in planning energy saving improvements and provides \$750 per unit in rebates to help pay for the upgrades. The program is open to multi-family buildings with five or more attached units in the nine-county Bay Area.

NEW WATER USE RESTRICTIONS

The City is implementing new water use restrictions throughout Mountain View as part of the statewide

effort to cope with the continuing drought. The new rules, which are currently in effect, prohibit landscape irrigation between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.,



prohibit watering more than three days per week for more than 15 minutes per day, and prohibit watering when it rains. The use of potable water in decorative water features is also prohibited.

MAJOR UPDATES



CITY IMPLEMENTS WILDLIFE PROTECTIONS AT SHORELINE

The City has implemented a wildlife management plan to prevent negative impacts to the more than 20 special species of birds and other animals living in and around Shoreline at Mountain View located along the San Francisco Bay. All projects proposed for the area are analyzed on a case-by-case basis to determine their impact on wildlife and the need for any necessary educational signage, fencing and buffers or barriers to protect native animals.

Some of the species in the area that are currently considered endangered and are protected by State or Federal law include the California clapper rail, California least tern, salt marsh harvest mouse, peregrine falcon, golden eagle, burrowing owl and the loggerhead shrike.

CATS AND WILDLIFE WORKING GROUP

The City has formed a Feral Cats and Wildlife Stakeholders Working Group. This informal, ad hoc group will be asked to share ideas on how we can better address feral cat populations and protect wildlife in North Bayshore and creek beds. Members of the group represent the diverse viewpoints surrounding the issue and will be holding two public meetings to gather more input from the community. Preliminary Mountain View Election Results

As of the time The View went to print, 2014 election results had not officially been verified and may still change; however, according to the Santa Clara County Registrar of Voters' unofficial semi-final results, Mountain View elected Pat Showalter, Ken Rosenberg and Lenny Siegel (in order of most votes received) to serve City Council starting in 2015. The Measure A ballot measure to increase Councilmember salaries to \$1000 per month also passed by a majority. Get official results in December at www.sccvote.org.

LEVI'S STADIUM PARKING PROGRAM

The City continues the implementation of the Levi's Stadium Parking Pilot Program through Spring 2015. The new football venue is located in the City of Santa Clara, but impacts parking near Mountain View's Downtown Transit Center during sporting and other events at the venue. As a result, the Council has initiated a pilot program that regulates parking in Mountain View parking structures and residential neighborhoods near the Transit Center.

In the Downtown commercial area, parking is allowed all day in Parking Structure 1, and Parking Lots 4, 8 and 9 for a fee. Time restrictions will be in place for all of the parking structures and lots. For weekday events, there is a three-hour time limit from 5:00 - 10:00 p.m. For weekend events, there is a three-hour time limit from 8:00 a.m. – 10:00 p.m. Castro Street will continue to have a one-hour time limit.

In residential neighborhoods near the Transit Center, there is a three-hour time limit for on street parking from 8:00 a.m. - 10:00 p.m. on stadium event days. Residents may obtain permits to park beyond the time

SHORELINE BOULEVARD CORRIDOR UPDATE

The City Council will review the recommended design concepts in late November for a plan to better integrate bicycle, pedestrian, car and bus travel along Shoreline Boulevard between the Downtown Transit Center and the North Bayshore Area, referred to as the Shoreline Boulevard Corridor. The design concepts include improvements to facilities and transit infrastructure.

EXPLAINING THE MINIMUM WAGE ORDINANCE

On October 9, 2014, the Mountain View City Council approved a Minimum Wage Ordinance establishing a minimum wage in the City of Mountain View of \$10.30 per hour effective July 1, 2015, with annual adjustments for inflation on January 1 of each following year.

The City Council also adopted a goal of reaching a \$15.00 per hour minimum wage by 2018, working in cooperation with neighboring cities and regional organizations, and with input from the Mountain View community. In March 2015, staff will update the Council on minimum wage provisions in the region and seek direction on a work plan to achieve this goal.

OPEN CITY HALL

PRECISE PLAN UPDATES

The City continues the process of updating the precise plans for three areas in Mountain View: North Bayshore, San Antonio, and El Camino Real. For these updates, the City is guided by the goals and policies set forth in the General Plan adopted in 2012. The General Plan is the key long-range policy document used to guide future planning and development in Mountain View. The General Plan Visioning Process that preceded the Plan's adoption provided the foundation for the major strategies and policies in the new Plan. More than 80 public meetings, workshops and events were held for the General Plan and attended by more than 1,500 participants. The engagement of our community continues as the City works to update the following precise plans:

NORTH BAYSHORE PRECISE PLAN

The City completed the draft Precise Plan and Environmental Impact Report (EIR) analysis for North Bayshore after



holding 16 public input meetings. The final public hearings with the Environmental Planning Commission and Council were held in November. The Plan was scheduled to be considered for adoption on First Reading November 25. EL CAMINO REAL PRECISE PLAN

SAN ANTONIO PRECISE PLAN

The San Antonio Precise Plan contains City standards and guidelines for SAN ANTONIO new development, circulation improvements and PRECISE PLAN open space. The Environmental Planning Commission (EPC) reviewed the Public Draft Precise Plan and Environmental Impact Report (EIR) in September, and Council provided input for Public Draft Precise Plan edits in October. The EPC provided a recommendation in November. The Plan was scheduled for adoption on First Reading December 2. LIBRARY OFFERS FREE TECHNOLOGY CLASSES FOR YOUTH

The Library offers a variety of technology clubs, classes and workshops for young people to help introduce them to everything from game design to artificial intelligence.

'Girls who Code' is a national organization dedicated to closing the gender gap in technology. The Library's Girls who Code Club, open to girls from Mountain View and Los Altos High Schools, is a joint venture of the two schools and introduces club members to game design, mobile technology, artificial intelligence, graphics and more.

'Alligator Zone' is a national movement to introduce high tech entrepreneurs to young people and their families and to show youth that good ideas can become a reality. The Library hosts programs bringing local technology experts in to talk with local students.

In addition, local high school student volunteers are sharing their love of technology with students in elementary, middle and high school by offering classes at the Library. Last Spring, these volunteers introduced 3rd-5th graders to simple programming using a graphic coding language called Scratch. This Fall, they conducted a five-week workshop for middle and high school students on programming in Java. In November, they taught an afternoon workshop on creating a webpage.


CERT TRAINING

WINTER STORM SAFETY and FLOOD PREVENTION

FLOOD PROTECTION INFORMATION



Flooding in these areas is caused by tidal flooding from the Bay and flooding from Permanente Creek. Below are suggestions for


things you can do to protect yourself and your property in the event of flooding.

FLOOD SAFETY



- Do not walk through flowing waters.
- Do not drive through a flooded area.
- Do not drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires.
- Have your electricity turned off by PG&E. Do not use appliances or motors that have become wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned and dried.
- Look before you step. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.
- Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Do not smoke or use candles, lanterns or open flames, unless you know the gas has been turned off and the area has been ventilated.
- Tune to radio stations KCBS (740AM) or KSJO (92.3FM) for emergency information, traffic updates and instructions.

FLOOD INSURANCE



By participating in the National Flood Insurance Program Community Rating System, the City earns a 10 percent discount on insurance rates for the community by exceeding minimum standards for flood risk reduction. This discount applies to National Flood Insurance policies issued or renewed. The actual cost of insurance will vary, depending upon the amount of coverage and degree of flood hazard. In certain instances, such as the purchase of a new home with a Federally-backed mortgage, National Flood Insurance is required. Even if flood insurance is not required or you live in a moderate-to-low risk area, the risk of flooding is still very real. FEMA recommends residents purchase flood insurance. Preferred rate policies start at \$119 per year.

FLOOD MAP INFORMATION



Upon request, the City will provide the public, lending institutions, real estate agents and insurance agents with certain flood map information. Call (650) 903-6311 during normal business hours, visit the Public Works Department at City Hall or access the City's website at www.mountainview.gov and click on *Ask Mountain View* for the following information:

- · Classification of whether a property is in or out of the Special Flood Hazard Area
- Additional flood insurance data for a site, such as the Flood Insurance Rate Map zone, base flood elevation or depth
- A handout on flood insurance purchase requirements

You can find out your flood risk online at Floodsmart.gov. This site provides relative risks, links to flood risk maps and other flood insurance community resources.

FLOOD PROTECTION TIPS



There are various actions that can be taken to flood proof structures. Electrical panel boxes, furnaces, water heaters and washer/dryers should be elevated or relocated to a location less likely to be flooded. Basement floor drains and interior and exterior backwater valves can be installed and interior floodwalls can be placed around utilities. If flooding is likely and time permits, move essential items and furniture to the upper floors of your home. Keep materials like sandbags, plywood, plastic sheeting and lumber handy for emergency waterproofing. This action will help minimize the amount of damage caused by floodwaters.

PREPARING FOR THE WINTER STORM SEASON



Winter storms cause power outages, flooding and traffic hazards. The City encourages residents to plan ahead for the possibility of storms this winter by taking the following precautions early:

REMOVE FALLEN LEAVES **\(\right)**



- Help prevent street flooding and sewer clogs by removing leaves.
- Place leaves in your yard trimmings toter for pick-up. If one toter is not sufficient, a second toter can be ordered by calling Recology® at (650) 967-3034.
- Compost leaves and other plant debris. You can obtain information about composting and composting workshops by contacting the City's Solid Waste Program at (650) 903-6311.
- Layer leaves in the roadway for pick-up by the street sweeper on scheduled sweeping days. Layers must be less than 3 inches deep and 3 feet wide. Leaves left in piles in the roadway will not be picked-up.
- Keep a list of emergency telephone numbers by each of

your telephones.

- For Police or Fire emergencies, call 9-1-1.
- To report power outages or downed power lines, call PG&E at (800) 743-5000.

OBTAIN SANDBAGS WHEN NECESSARY



Sand and sandbags are available at no charge to Mountain View residents at the City's Municipal Operations Center, 231 North Whisman Road. Bring a shovel to fill the sandbags.

REPORT FLOODING OR STANDING WATER

Call the Public Services Division at (650) 903-6329 to report flooding or standing water during normal business hours. After hours or on weekends, call the City's Emergency Communications Center at (650) 903-6395.

REPORT DOWNED TREES AND LIMBS

Report downed trees and limbs during normal business hours by calling the Forestry and Roadway Landscape Division at (650) 903-6273. After hours or on weekends, call the City's Emergency Communications Center at (650) 903-6395.

Do Not Touch Downed Power Lines



Assume all downed power lines are dangerous and call both 9-1-1 and PG&E at (800) 743-5000 immediately. Stay tuned to your local radio station for power outage updates.

PREPARE AT HOME

Keep an emergency kit on hand with a battery-powered radio, flashlights, fresh batteries and a first-aid kit. Check to see that your first-aid kit is well stocked and medications have not expired.

Stock a supply of easy to open, prepared food, a can opener, bottled water and pet food in case of a power outage. Keep extra blankets and warm clothes in a safe, dry place in case your heat goes off.

If you use an electric generator, be sure it is installed properly, and then call PG&E to let them know you have one. Improperly installed generators put property and the lives of utility workers in the area at risk.

SIGN UP FOR A FREE TREE

Residents who wish to receive a free tree for planting in their yard may fill out and submit the request form included in this issue of *The View* by 5:00 p.m. on January 23, 2015 or visit the City's website for an online application. The City will deliver the tree of choice to eligible residents during the week of March 5, and residents agree to plant and maintain the tree on their property.

RESIDENTS MAY CHOOSE FROM FIVE VARIETIES OF TREES.

- The Red Maple, Crimson King is a deciduous tree which features dense maroon red foliage all summer. A good shade tree, it grows quickly, adapts to a variety of soils and will reach a height of 50 feet or more.
- The Fringe Tree is a deciduous tree that requires full sun and moderate watering. It grows to 30 feet, blooms with white lacey flowers and has an purple-blue fruit that attracts birds and wildlife.
- The Chitalpa Pink Dawn has leaves that are 4 to 5 inches long and frilly, trumpet-shaped flowers. It is dry-spell tolerant and grows to 30 feet.
- The Flowering Cherry grows up to 25 feet and has beautiful bark and flowers in the early Spring with white or pink blooms.
- The Zelkova is a medium to large deciduous tree growing to 60 feet tall. The leaves are green to dark green in Spring and throughout the Summer, changing to yellows, oranges and reds in Autumn.
